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



INTERSOS is present in Greece since March 2016 with the aim of providing holistic support and long term durable solutions as a response to the migration crisis. Throughout the duration of its mission it has focused on holistic service provision, the search for local contextualised solutions and strong rooting in community based protection. INTERSOS, having undertaken a series of innovative initiatives, supports hundreds of people in Greece who had to leave their homeland

As it completes seven years of presence in Greece, INTERSOS HELLAS sends the strongest message against all forms of discrimination and in favor of the protection and respect for human life.

Over these seven years, INTERSOS HELLAS has provided comprehensive assistance to asylum seekers, refugees, and migrants in Macedonia, Epirus, Thessaly, Lesvos, and Attica. Concurrently, it has successfully implemented independent national programs such as "Vaccines for All," "Food for All," and "Protection for All Minors." These programs aim to protect and meet the basic needs of particularly vulnerable social groups and to vaccinate them against COVID-19.

INTERSOS HELLAS is active implementing partner of the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) within the project HELIOS (Hellenic Integration Support for Beneficiaries of International Protection), which is funded by the Ministry of Migration and Asylum.

The project aims at promoting the integration of beneficiaries of international and temporary protection in the Greek society increasing the prospects of beneficiaries towards self- reliance, through:

- ·accommodation support,
- ·integration courses (Greek language, life skills etc.), remployability and job readiness support through job counseling and ·sensitization of the local community and promoting social cohesion.

INTERSOS HELLAS supports the accommodation support pillar in Epirus and Thessaly by facilitating beneficiaries' access to independent living, supporting rental procedures through contact with landlords.







Food for All





individuals have received services from the project in 2023

Since December 2021, INTERSOS HELLAS has been implementing a new initiative to support vulnerable populations, the "Food for All" program. The goal of this initiative is to address the food needs of the most vulnerable groups of migrants and refugees residing in Athens and to ensure their food security. In Athens, thousands of people do not have stable access to food and are in a state of emergency regarding their survival.

The "Food for All" initiative has been implemented in collaboration with the Greek Forum of Migrants until July 2023, and with the Greek Forum of Refugees from August 2023 onwards. It is supported and funded by the Stichting Vluchteling - SV and LDS.











«#Together: Holistic Support for Effective Access to Socio-Economic Rights and Livelihoods in Epirus»





INTERSOS HELLAS, in collaboration with the UNHCR and the Cultural Center of the Municipality of Ioannina / Intercultural Center for Social Inclusion "Academy," implements the program: "#Together: Holistic Support for Effective Access to Socio-Economic Rights and Livelihoods in Epirus".

The aim of the project is to support refugees and migrants residing in Epirus in acquiring tools, information, and resources that will help them integrate into the labor market.

As part of this, information sessions are conducted in the reception and accommodation facilities in Epirus, specialized workshops on resume writing, document issuance, work environment in Greece, as well as preparation for job interviews.

Additionally, efforts are made to search for available job positions and support the connection with potential employees. Finally, these efforts are reinforced through the use of the "Adama Job Center" platform.

The "Adama Job Center" is a user-friendly online tool that allows employers to find suitable candidates and enables job seekers to apply for available positions.









Protection for All Minors

«Protection for All Minors» is a project implemented by the Network for Children's Rights, in collaboration with INTERSOS HELLAS, offers comprehensive support to unaccompanied minors in Greece who live in precarious or homeless conditions. The program is carried out under the auspices of the National Emergency Response Mechanism for Unaccompanied Minors in Precarious Living Conditions ("National Mechanism")

The aim of this program is to inform, support and empower unaccompanied minors in order to move away from precarious living conditions, by transferring them to accommodation for unaccompanied minors (shelters) or semi-independent living apartments. The project is supported and funded by Stichting Vluchteling – SV.





Mental Health and Psychosocial Support in Lesvos





In 2021, INTERSOS initiated a Mental Health and Psychosocial Support intervention in Mavrovouni, Lesvos, to address the increasing challenges in the field of mental health.

The project supports vulnerable groups showing signs of psychological distress, who have survived gender-based violence and/or are the sole or primary caregivers of a dependent family member.

The MHPSS INTERSOS HELLAS Team, composed of Psychologists, Case Managers and Protection Officers ensure that the mental health programme adheres to a holistic and rights-based approach





Capacity strengthening and ensuring protection for vulnerable migrants, asylum seekers, and refugees

INTERSOS HELLAS, in collaboration with the Pandemic Center of the University of Bergen, held two workshops for the exchange of expertise and best practices on issues related to pandemic management and healthcare crises.

Specifically, topics such as the effects on mental health during and after the COVID-19 pandemic, the economic and livelihood impacts on the target population, vaccination strategies implemented in various countries, and emerging challenges related to malnutrition and food insecurity due to the pandemic were examined.

The discussion involved representatives from civil society organizations, international agencies, and stakeholders, highlighting the urgent need for information and support for all involved parties.

"Being Hungry in Europe: An Analysis of the Food Insecurity Experienced by Refugees, Asylum Seekers, Migrants, and Undocumented People in Greece"

INTERSOS HELLAS, HIAS Greece, and the Greek Council for Refugees have published the report titled "Being Hungry in Europe: An Analysis of the Food Insecurity Experienced by Refugees, Asylum Seekers, Migrants, and Undocumented People in Greece"

According to the report:

30,1% of individuals who received support through the program are recognized refugees. The majority of individuals who benefited from the program are children (54%), of whom 1 in 3 (23.7%) are under the age of 4. 59.4% have access to food only 1-3 times a week.

The report highlights the challenges related to food security as derived from the data collected during the implementation of the "Food for All" project. The program aims to address the primary need of the most vulnerable groups of migrants and refugees residing in Athens and to ensure their food security.


"Caught Between Scylla and Charybdis: Asylum Seekers and Refugees and the Greek Asylum Process: Impacts on Mental Health and Psychosocial Well-being."

After three years on Lesvos, we present a new report on the impact of living conditions on the mental health of refugees and asylum seekers, especially women.

The main categories of psychiatric symptoms identified mainly involve adjustment disorders (4.28%), depressive disorders (2.85%), post-traumatic reactions (2.14%), and symptoms related to multiple disorders (10.27%).

The lack of long-term mental health services and the complex reception system exacerbate the situation.
